

Ten Big Daily Reminders





I wake up lost every morning. At least that's what it feels like. Perhaps something similar is true of you.

Somehow during the night I've forgotten the big realities about God and the universe and myself and the gospel. I desperately need to steady myself with biblical truth rather than stumbling forward to live from unbelief.

I tend to forget the big realities during the day as well. I regularly catch myself living on the idiotic assumption that I will constantly remember the things that really matter — and that I will act in line with them. I assume that the realm of the seen and touched will not overwhelm the realm of the unseen and hoped for.

But in reality, whether it's night or day, I don't stay awake to what's truly important for very long. I am like that college kid who sits in church on Sunday morning trying to keep his eyes open after an irresponsibly late Saturday night. My eyelids droop by default, and my mind wanders from the glories of the Bible to superfluous, naturalistic daydreams (that may or may not end with an embarrassing full-body twitch that snaps me awake again).

So, I've learned over time to put structures in place that remind me of those unseen things, especially during my bleary-eyed, half-conscious mornings.

One effort is this list of ten truths. I hung it up next to our dining room rocking chair (my preferred spot for study and contemplation). It's developed over the years as a list of the daily reminders I need most. Many of them overlap substantially, but a double reminder only reinforces the original purpose.

I've added a short commentary for each in hopes that something here might help you in your pursuit of remembering the biggest truths that we can be prone to assume and forget.

1. God exists. (Exodus 3:14; John 8:58)

It seems so simple, so basic, but I tend to wake up a naturalist, and a narcissistic one at that. I assume that all there is in the world is what is in front of my face. My bed, my wife, my kids, and most importantly myself. The simple yet ultimate existence of God immediately clears my lens, makes me small, and infuses meaning into every step. God exists — and that changes everything.

2. God loves you. (Romans 5:8; John 16:27; Jeremiah 32:40–41)

Another massive biblical reality, this immediately counters my hesitation to embrace God's ultimate authority, reminding me that he has set his affections on this little speck of a person. He is far from indifferent toward me.

3. Jesus died for you, and the Father has now bound himself to give you only good things. (Romans 8:28, 32)

This draws me quickly to the central reality of all history: the cross. It is an objective truth set in time and space, so it immediately draws my gaze away from my own capacity to garner acceptance from God through my efforts. Furthermore, the outworkings of the cross make clear that even the harshest trials will come to me as blessing, for my ultimate good, no matter how bad I feel at the time.

4. God sees you as perfect. (Hebrews 10:14; 2 Corinthians 5:21)

My self-absorption, anxiety, and self-pity know no bounds. They must be beaten into submission by the beauty of imputed righteousness. The question "How am I doing?" is met head-on with the answer "Perfect." In that regard, every day is a good day.

5. That is because of Jesus's perfection, not yours. You deserve hell. (Romans 3:10; 1 Timothy 1:15)

There are two main purposes here: first, to counterpunch when my flesh looks for a way to subtly claim credit for the perfection that is mine only in Jesus; second, to maintain a sense of trembling gratitude for my salvation. While I enjoy the glory of the gospel, there should always be an awestruck voice in the back of my mind that is whispering, "I shouldn't be here."

6. You will die. (James 4:14; Hebrews 9:27)

Nothing brings clarity to me like this simple and straightforward reminder. How quickly I assume my earthly immortality, and how often I need to think of myself as a terminal cancer patient.

7. You will live forever in the new heavens and new earth. (Romans 8:18; Hebrews 10:34)

I don't want to be a clearheaded *fearer* of death, like some atheistic poet. I want to glory in the guarantee of indescribable bliss that is just around the corner. And I want to live like it's real — because it is.

8. For now, you are an exile on the earth. (Hebrews 11:13–16)

This keeps me from feeling at home when I'm not at home (especially in my own home). It prepares me for not fitting in, for weird looks when I speak with conviction about Jesus, and for holding loosely to every bit of earthly life.

9. Nothing on earth is truly worth putting your hope in. (Jeremiah 2:13; Galatians 6:14)

This is a practical specification of #8. It is right for me to remember that I will inevitably be disappointed by every earthly pursuit or relationship or emotional experience. It runs me back to my true Home and the true Bridegroom.

10. You have no right to be unhappy. (Philippians 4:4; 1 Peter 1:8–9)

This is a summarizing application of all the previous reminders, but it merits its own slot. How quick I am to become "blah" when there is a treasure trove of happy reality at my disposal! I must beat this into my discontent little brain. I can be plenty unhappy, but I have no right to be.

These reminders flee from my mind like stray socks in an armful of laundry. Every time I pick one up, another falls. By the time I read #10, #1 is beckoning again. What a grace that #4 is still true!







Samaritan's Purse Operation Christmas Child Shoebox Information

Operation Christmas Child (OCC) is a simple way to share the love of Christ with a child. It's far more than just a shoebox, it's sharing the hope the Gospel provides with someone who may never have the opportunity to hear it again while meeting some of their physical needs. Please pray for OCC and 2019's worldwide collection of shoeboxes. Please also prayerfully consider what to include in your box, and pray for your shoebox recipient that they will be open to the Gospel.

Once again we will be offering a church wide participation with Operation Christmas Child, the Shoebox Ministry of Samaritan's Purse. Shoe boxes are filled with new items for children which may include school supplies, clothing, hygiene items, and of course toys. Once collected the shoe boxes are sent to Ministry partners, often churches, in 116 countries around the world, and offered to children thru outreach events. At each event recipients hear a Gospel presentation and also receive a booklet titled, The Greatest Gift, written in their own language that again clearly presents the Gospel. In 2018, First Baptist members provided 135 shoeboxes to Samaritan's Purse.

Shoe boxes will be available in the library beginning October 20th, along with more details on what can and cannot be included in a shoebox and costs associated with shipping. We will need to have all shoeboxes filled and returned to the kitchen by Sunday November 17th, and they will be taken to the closest drop off location that week. Do You Know What Released Time Bible Class Is?

Released Time - a Michigan law that requires public schools to release children, who have written parental permissions, for up to two hours per week to attend religious instruction classes at a nearby location.

Bible - The oldest book in the world that millions of people still read every day! RBM Ministries is non-denominational in its teaching.

Classes - Not just "fun and games" - but vital spiritual and character-building education in a happy, enjoyable setting.

History - We represent over 75 years of service to school-age children - one of America's oldest Christian ministries, designed to reach and serve boys and girls of all ages. RBM Ministries serves many churches in your area.

First Baptist Church provides transportation from the town elementary schools to our church once a month on the 3rd Friday of each month during the school year. Debbie Price, our supported missionary from RBM Ministries teaches the class. (She also does our Vacation Bible School!). If you would like your child(ren) to attend this class, you must fill out one of their permission slips that are at the Children's Check in Desk or Oakview and Gateway Elementary have them also. You must return the form to the school your child attends, or if you home school, you may turn in the form to the Church office or bring it with you to the first class. If your children attend any of the rural Elementary schools in the St. Johns School District, please check with the school office to see if they have a class and when it meets.

Debbie was born in Pontiac, Michigan. She was the fourth out of the five kids born to Chuck and Lois Price. The family moved to Lansing when Debbie was about two years old and moved again to a farm in the St. Johns area when she was about six. Until this move, they attended a church that did not preach the Gospel. Pastor Bob Prange was the pastor at Grove Bible Church at that time. He was one of their first friends and helped them move in. He invited them to visit the church which was just down the road. The first Sunday, the family stayed home because they were working on the drainage ditch so the indoor restroom could be used instead of the outhouse. On Monday, Pastor Prange came over and helped with the digging while Chuck was at work in Lansing. The next Sunday the family attended Grove Bible Church and heard the Gospel for the first time. Chuck and Lois both trusted in Christ that first Sunday. Debbie made this decision a year later. She was seven years old and her older sister, Kathy, led her to the Lord at home one night just before bed.

Debbie attended Piedmont Bible College in Winston-Salem, North Carolina for four years, receiving a Bachelor of Religious Education. She then taught in Christian schools for several years, including seven years in Papua New Guinea. Debbie taught third and fourth grade at Numonohi, which is the New Tribes School for Missionary kids near Goroka.

Debbie went back to school for four summers at Pensacola Christian College and earned her Master's in Sacred Music in 2000.

In 2007, Debbie's hours were cut at the Christian School where she had been teaching music and she began looking for something else. As she prayed and considered what the Lord wanted her to do, she was impressed with the urgency to reach children for Christ in an increasingly anti-Christian world. Her attention was drawn to RBM Ministries and she pursued this possibility. In September of 2008 she became a field worker with RBM.

RBM was originally called Rural Bible Mission because they worked in one-room country schools. When the government ruled to take the Bible out of public schools, RBM switched to doing Released Time Bible Classes. This is a class taught to public school children during school hours, but off campus at a nearby church. Parents sign their children up for this program at the beginning of the year and they attend one class per month from October through April. During the summer, the field workers teach Vacation Bible School at different churches each week.

Debbie took over the ministry in Clinton, Ionia, and Shiawassee Counties in May of 2009. This year she will teach 27 Released Time Bible Classes each month in this area. During the summer, she averages eight or nine Vacation Bible Schools.

Prayer needs for this ministry include travel safety, continued good health, finding suitable transportation for the children, getting enough helpers for the classes, tender hearts, clarity when teaching, and working with school personnel. A big concern is that it has become increasingly difficult to get flyers out to the parents with information about classes and the opportunity to sign their children up. Please pray for these requests.

Kent was raised in a Christian home but did not want to give up his sin or be held accountable to God for it. At the age of nine, he was scared to go to hell and prayed that Christ would save him. It was not until Kent was thirteen that he started to read the Bible and finally understood that Christ did not die just to save him from hell but to have a relationship with him. From that point, he wanted to share the hope he has with those he meets. Tribal church planting had never crossed his mind before he entered the New Tribes Bible Institute in Jackson, Michigan. His initial reason for attending the Bible school was to get grounded in the scriptures before starting a ministry with homeless people. There, he began to hear about how there are thousands of language groups who have never heard the Gospel in their own language. As he became aware of the need, God started to work in his heart and gave him the desire to plant a church among one of these unreached people groups.

Jenny grew up in rural Missouri and was raised in a Christian family. As a child, she realized her need of salvation and asked God to save her, but she never had assurance of her salvation. At age 15, she admitted her sin, affirmed her belief in Christ's death as payment for her sins, and asked God to save her. When she attended college, she was involved in Campus Crusade for Christ and became aware of the great need for the Gospel around the world. God started directing her heart towards missions. After college, Jenny entered New Tribes Bible Institute. Bible School was a life-changing experience as her background had been very legalistic. She came to understand God's grace and her new nature in Christ. She became even more excited about God's heart for a lost world.

God has led Kent and Jenny to do church planting among the Maindo people group in the Zambezia province of Mozambique. The Maindo consists of 50,000-70,000 people who mostly live in the district of Micaune, in the northern part of the Zambezi River Delta. In anticipation of ministry among the Maindo people, Kent and Jenny moved to Portugal in 2008 to begin learning Portuguese. In August of 2009, they moved to Nampula, Mozambique and in April of 2010 to Quelimane (capital of the province where the Maindo are located) to continue with Portuguese language/culture study. They are partnering with Arnie Johnson, an American Ethnos360 Missionary, and his wife Rubenita (Rubi), a Brazilian Ethnos360 Missionary. The Johnsons have a daughter, Joana, who is 5 months younger than Samuel.

In July of 2012, the Schafers and Johnsons moved to the community of Micaune Sede (the administrative post for all of Micaune). For 6 months, they lived with a Maindo family as they were in the process of obtaining land and building a traditional house in the Alfane neighborhood (about a 10-minute motorcycle ride from Micaune Sede). In January 2013, the Schafers moved to Alfane and, in February, they officially started Maindo language studies. In June 2015, their team began developing primers for the Maindo literacy program and, in June 2016, the Schafers returned to the US for furlough. After the birth of their son, Samuel, they returned to Mozambique in October 2017 and continued Maindo language and culture study. They and their co-worker, Arnie, hope to be finish up language and culture study in late 2019. When they finish language study, the Maindo team plans to finish developing materials for the Maindo literacy program and to begin translating the Bible and developing Chronological Bible lessons in the Maindo language. Jenny will be developing the literacy materials, Arnie will be translating the Bible, and Kent will be developing Chronological Bible lessons. Their goal is to share the Gospel with the Maindo people in a way that clearly communicates their sin and need of a Savior in order to see the Maindo people come to a saving knowledge of Christ, grow in their relationship with Him, and develop into a maturing local body of believers who God will use to reach out to other Maindo people and, hopefully, even to neighboring people groups and other countries.

In Micaune, the Schafers have cell phone coverage and slow internet. They can receive email attachments (up to 2MB) and can usually access Facebook, Facebook Messenger, WhatsApp, and Skype.
