FUNERALS

Funerals are a sensitive and difficult time for the families involved. As a church we want to show compassion and concern for those who have lost a loved one. Whether it is a close or distant relative, there is always a sense of loss and separation.

At the same time, due to the size of our church, we realize that there are limits that have to be placed on the use of our facility and the energies of our people. After much thought and prayer, the pastoral staff and deacons drew up the following guidelines for funerals and funeral dinners. We realize that no policy is perfect and that from time to time it may cause a misunderstanding. We hope that publishing these guidelines will at least help families to know the policy prior to the stressful time that inevitably surrounds a death.

FUNERALS: Funerals may be conducted in our church building only when the deceased person has been a member or regular attendee of our church. We would consider an exception only in the following circumstances:

1. If the funeral of a fellow believer from another church is anticipated to be larger than their facility will accommodate, we will consider allowing the family to use our building. The deceased person must have been a member or regular attendee of his or her church, and the church must have the same doctrinal stand as our church. The pastoral staff must approve each request.

2. If longtime members of First Baptist Church retire and move to another part of the state or country, and they desire, upon their death, to have their funeral back at First Baptist Church, we will consider the request. The pastor or pastors conducting the funeral, if not a current pastor of FBC, must be in agreement with the doctrinal stand of our church. The pastoral staff must approve each request.

FUNERAL LUNCHEONS: Funeral luncheons will be provided by the church following the funeral if the deceased person was a member or regular attendee of our church or if the deceased person was the spouse of a member or regular attendee. The church will be responsible for providing food, and adequate number of workers, and the set up and take down of the tables and chairs.

We will be serving with Bridgebuilders, a program within Sonshine's ministries, this is how they describe their program:

“Our Bridgebuilder program is a service-learning program dedicated to hosting teams of high school, college or adult participants for a week or weekend in the Woodlawn neighborhood of Chicago, IL. Our program is based on a “Listen-Learn-Serve” model and has been influenced by the Chalmers center and the recent book “When Helping Hurts” by Steve Corbett and Brian Fikkert. It is our goal to provide a healthy, sustainable and reciprocal program where participants and locals are mutually empowered. Bridgebuilders places a heavy emphasis on listening to and learning from our community and neighbors as we serve alongside one another. We believe that God has revealed himself in unique ways in low-income, minority-populated, urban contexts like ours and we are very excited to share this with our brothers and sisters in Christ who often come from primarily suburban/rural, middle-class, mostly white areas of our country.



We are extremely excited to see how God will use us on this trip and to see how He will use this trip in the lives of our group as well! The cost of the trip will be approximately \$350 for each participant and we would love to have our church family partner with us in prayer and by helping provide funds for those who need assistance. Please make your check out to First Baptist Church and mark your giving envelope “Teen Missions Trip” and all money donated will be divided up for the team. You may also give online at our website. Craig was raised in St. Johns in a great Christian family. He was saved at the age of 12 but did not really start living for the Lord until around age 21. Craig knew God wanted more out of his life - and he wanted more out of his own life as well. He wanted his life to have an impact on eternity. At that time he was first exposed to foreign missions and knew that was what God wanted him to do. Craig fought God for quite a while thinking he was not spiritual enough for the job. However God showed Craig that He uses those who will give their meaningless lives to Him and depend on Him to use their lives for His glory.

Craig met Shelly in his first year of Bible School and they were married the year after. Shelly grew up in the Philippines where her parents are missionaries. From the beginning, she was introduced to what God is doing all over the world - drawing men to Himself. Although she was saved at the age of 7, Shelly's life consisted of meeting others expectations of an MK but her heart was never in it. When she graduated from high school she attended New Tribes Bible Institute where God really started working in her life. Seriously studying God's word for herself greatly impacted her heart, mind and soul. On graduation, Shelly was considering becoming an elementary teacher, but the Lord kept bringing missions to her mind. She visited her parents in the Philippines that summer and once again saw the great spiritual need there. God really used that time to convince Shelly that He wanted to give her the privilege of serving Him overseas. Shelly returned to Bible school to work for a year and planned to continue the training the following year. After she and Craig met and married they continued training together.


Craig and Shelly left for Indonesia in May of 2006 to continue the process of accomplishing their long-term goal of church planting. They spent a year (through Oct. 2007) in Salatiga intensively studying the national language and culture. After completing language school they moved to Sentani in the Papua region and then to Wamena in April 2009 to prepare for their move interior. Craig, Jeff Palmer and Matt Musser (teammates) spent about nine months traveling into the central islands of Indonesia for many survey trips of Duga land. This is a people group of about 30,000 who live in a 30 by 50 mile mountainous area. Those in the Duga language group consider themselves Christian as there was a missionary among them for 20 years, but they still have little understanding of the gospel. There is a great need for discipleship and new teaching.

The team was led to locate into a valley called the Kora to work with the Kora people (a distant dialect of the Duga language group) in a village called Nggingginim (the ng is like the ng sound in sing). They completed house construction and moved into the village in December, 2009. Since then they have studied the Kora language. Craig completed his studies in the summer of 2013. At that point, Craig began preparing a literacy curriculum for the Kora people to teach them to read and write in their own language. After completing the curriculum, the Kora team taught literacy to 15 students who graduated in July of 2014 with about 11 of them being able to read at a fairly good level.

From that time on, Craig has been getting Bible lessons ready while a co-worker has been doing translation. Their hopes are to begin teaching the Kora people about the saving grace of Jesus starting July 1, 2015! It has been a long road but the day is getting closer and closer to when the Kora can finally hear and understand what Christ has done for them. Please keep them in your prayers as they finish the preparations to teach and then as they teach chronologically the story of redemption.



Food for Thought...A Challenge to be Thinking Christians



No, Hanging Out With Your Friends is Not the Church Aaron Earls

Who doesn't like getting together for a fun dinner with friends and sharing about life? What's not to love about having deep conversations about spiritual truths with those close to you?

Those things are great and we should do more of them, but—I'm sorry to break this to you—they aren't church.

Increasingly, I see younger evangelicals wondering if they can call their spiritual hang outs with friends a congregation. They are exploring the question: What is church?

That is a worthwhile question and we can affirm various styles of doing church. A different methodology does not automatically mean heretical ecclesiology.

In Asia, house churches are exploding. In America, megachurches and multisite congregations are seeing the most growth. There are positives and negatives about each model, but we can see ways in which each of those can be healthy, biblical churches.

Too many, however, are not driven by a desire to be a part of a biblical church of any model. They simply want an excuse to claim their discussions over dinner as church.

Here are five ways these gatherings of friends fail short of what it means to be the church.

1. They only capture part of the church.

This line of thinking reduces all it means to be a church to one or two functions. At most, it includes sharing biblical doctrine and forming community.

Those are two vital aspects of what it means to be a church, but other parts are required before a gathering of believers becomes *the* gathering of believers as the church.

Before it could be called a church, there would need to be some practice of ordinances, biblical roles of leadership, evangelism, and discipleship among other things.

2. They raise questions of self-centeredness.

When someone desires to break away from being an active part of a local church and instead wants to substitute a gathering of friends in its place, the question to consider is not "Can we?" but rather "Why would we?"

It's a matter of motivation. If you and your friends feel called to plant a biblical church in your home that reaches the surrounding community, then perhaps God will use your group that way.

But here is where you need to pray and examine your heart. Because if, on the other hand, you are more driven by personal preferences, a desire to be the one calling the shots, tired of being around others, or a host of self-centered reasons, you need to get back involved in a local church as soon as possible.

3. They open our hearts to heresy.

Recent history is replete with dangerous warnings of what happens to those who leave and downplay the necessity of gathering as a local church.

Different aged and different culture Christians are much less likely to be tempted in the same way. A multigenerational, multicultural gathering can serve as a spotlight for temptations more common in specific groups.

When you serve beside those different from you in the church, they can help illuminate blind spots in your life and protect you from drifting into heresy. We help each other.

4. They prevent us from growing as we should.

You and I need other people to be the church. We need other people who aren't like us to be the church. We need other people who aren't like us to help us become more like Christ. And part of that process is the natural spiritual sanding that results from this type of gathering.

Other people who are in different life stages than us, have different personalities than us, come from different backgrounds than us, not only protect us from heresy, they help chip away and sand off our self-centered traits.

When we *only* gather with friends and those like us, we remove much of the way God uses others in the body to refine us.

At its heart, it's a lack of humility. The desire to be only with those like yourself assumes that only they can teach you and help you grow. It dismisses the contributions others can (and would) make in your sanctification.

5. They rob us of places of service.

We miss out on so much when we remove ourselves from a local body of believers gathered together as the church. How do you express your spiritual gifts or engage consistently in service?

There are so many avenues for growth and service that can never be yours if you exchange being a part of a church with hanging out with friends.

The church comes together to serve one another using the spiritual gifts the Holy Spirit has given us and goes out to serve others using the equipping of the saints the church provides for us.

Much like the oxymoron of an "inactive church member," substituting gathering with friends for church steals so many of the joys and blessings, even if they are unseen, that come from being a part of the local church.

Will you be hurt within the church? Absolutely, but who is to say Christ will not use that to conform you to His image? In fact, He's already promised to do so.

I understand the desire to feel connected to God with other people like you, but that's why churches have small groups and God provides us with friends.

Jesus has promised to be in the midst of even two or three gathered in His name, but He has not called that the church.

If you are gathering with a group of friends to talk about life and the Scriptures, don't stop. But don't confuse it with church either.

You and your group should seek to build up the bride of Christ, not try to replace her.
